#### **Word Pairs**

We make it easy to teach and learn word pairs. Word pairs, or what experts call collocations, are the correct use of the words in context. Research has shown that collocations boost fluency in writing and increase reading age.

What exactly are they? A word pair or collocation is a combination of two or more words that are frequently found together in text such as 'chiselled jaw'.

Some people say it's teaching a 'writer's intuition'. For example, the word 'blundering' is statistically paired with 'blundering fool', 'blundering beginner', and 'blundering politician'.

And what's best, developing a writer's intuition needs to be a lifelong goal for every student.

# How Mrs Wordsmith Aligns with the National Curriculum



We Promote the Pleasure of Reading and Books:

Our illustrations present the meaning of a word in a fun and engaging way. This characterization of the word gives children a love of words themselves.

Our Illustrated Words Inspire Conversations About Meaning:

Each of our illustrated words tells its own story, giving children an easy way to talk about a word's definition and their favourite words. The illustrations, along with the accompanying definition, teach context.

Our Words are Based on the Building Blocks of Narrative:

The KS1 and KS2 curriculum focuses heavily on a student's ability to use English for storytelling and narratives. Mrs Wordsmith's first 6 months of vocabulary are drawn from storytelling themes, including character, setting, action, and emotion.


Our Words Can Be Used to **Teach Vocabulary Strategies:** 

The national curriculum also has a strong focus on strategies to break vocabulary words down to their component parts. 'Unbearable' becomes recognisable partly through being the negative (un-) of an ability (-able) - which leaves only the root (bear) to clarify. With illustrations to convey meaning, words are clarified along with these affixes.

Our Words Can Help Teach Decoding Strategies:

Mrs Wordsmith exposes students to new combinations of letters that produce different sounds (phonic knowledge). They'll learn to say 'Audacious' and learn the 'Au-' sound and the '-cious' sound. They will then be ready to face other words with these letter combinations, like 'Auditorium' and 'Vicious'. This ability to decode letters into their sounded word is central to word reading across the KS1/KS2 curriculum and clears a path towards effective spelling of words, away from errors like 'oditorium' or 'vishus'.
